Commonwealth Government Environmental Grant Native Plant Project

With the help of Shed volunteers we have installed star pickets and sprayed two selected areas around the Shed buildings to kill off weeds and grass.

Thirteen different varieties of native plants were chosen that are endemic to the Duffy Forest area and do limit being a bush fire hazard.

Some 350 plants were ordered from the local Terry Hills company Harvest Seeds and Native Plants, along with protective sleeves and bamboo stakes.

A team of five then dug individual holes and planted out the native plants in specific areas. Low level grass species were planted a safe distance from each building, then larger native shrubs further away, as recommended.

Each plant has a sleeve and bamboo stakes to protect it from Wallabies that frequent the area always looking for plant food.

A mix of native mulch was delivered and spread out around each plant to keep the soil moist, and help protect each plant.

Some mulch was spread in front of Shed B to help reduce the muddy area and also near the Douglas Pickering Pavilion to help divert rainwater away from our buildings.

We then watered each plant and fortunately the area has received good follow up rain since planting.

With the Covid restrictions we still have some native plants to plant, and will complete once we can return to the Shed. With further watering and being mid winter, it is the ideal time to plant native plants.

Come summer we should see an improved upgraded area of native plants, natural to the area growing around our Shed.

Along with the work being done above for the replanting, we also want to maintain the grasses and trees we have already

Mark Champion is involved in the team doing the design and implementation of the new Dust Extraction Infrastructure for The Shed

Part of that is the purchase of a Laguna P Flux Cyclone Dust Extractor. This is 170 kilos of dust sucking goodness, with a HEPA filter and integrated dust bin

It does however come in around 300 pieces, requiring assembly.

The first photo shows the jigsaw puzzle in Mark's garage, the second shows the how the completed unit will look

It will (hopefully) be ready for installation when the Shed reopens, and will form the basis of dust collection for the Woodturning and Bandsaw area
