STEM

STEM stands for Science Technology and Mathematics. The subjects are a major drive by the Education Department to encourage students to engage with the subjects.

Hetta Mollema, one of our Shedders, has taken part in the program for the last few years under the CSIRO education program to assist the schools with their experience. The props, to demonstrate various aspects of the technology, are of course made in the Shed. He also makes models for the Power House museum for the same purpose.

On the Northern Beaches ten public schools hold a Science Fair once a year as a culmination of their STEM activities. Last year the subject was "Drones, Robots and Droids". The Mona Vale Primary school, where his granddaughter is a pupil, chose with him to program small, low cost, robots to simulate the new B-Line bus line from the Northern Beaches to the city.

The route was laid out on a 4-metre board. The students had to program the robots to follow the line of the bus route and to stop if there was an obstacle or if the traffic light was red. The whole program was so heavily attended by the students that they had to split into two groups of 15 students each. Their greatest fun on the Science Fair day was to show the project off to the other schools. The highlight was to cause the buses to crash, creating a major bus pile-up along Military Road, demonstrating the disruption to the bus services.
