
In the interest of the safety and health of our members, many of whom are in the vulnerable age group, we need to enforce the revised regulations

- Face masks are now voluntary, but should be worn if social distancing is not possible or for dust creating activities.
- It is vital that you book a place in the Shed using the <u>Eventbrite</u> booking system to manage the number of people. This is the <u>link</u> to the booking system.
- Numbers in the lunch room must now be strictly kept to a maximum of 20.
- There is alternative seating at the outdoor picnic tables which members are encouraged to use.
- Ensure you sign in and out of the Service NSW App using the QR code when arriving and leaving the Shed.

FEIN Dust Collector/Extractor

Your cooperation is essential in the interest of our members.

The Shed has purchased five new Fein Dust Extractors/Collectors to reduce the fine dust pollution to the benefit of the health of our members.

The Fein dust collector is a high-pressure low volume (HPLV) dust extractor fitted with a "permanent filter" and a HEMA/ HEPA fine filter that collects 99.7% of fine dust particles, preventing them being exhausted to the atmosphere. The permanent filter ensures that larger dust particles do not clog up the fine filter and that larger particles are collected in the base (bucket) of the extractor.

Some dust extractors are permanently attached to machines, i.e., Panel Saw and Drop Saw. These are **not intended** to be detached and used for other purposes. Mobile dust extractors should be used with care, in the same way as a household vacuum. The extractor is fitted with a long flexible hose, power cable and is fitted with wheels enabling freedom of movement over an extended area. A variety of attachments are available. The extractor is intended for use with wood and normal dust. IT IS NOT TO BE USED FOR METAL AND FIBROUS COMPOSITE MATERIALS.

The Dust extractors should be emptied on a regular basis. The top motor and fine filter portion should be detached by undoing the clips on both sides of the extractor and separating the top; The "white permanent filter" should be removed and, either a plastic waste bag be placed over the base unit and the base unit be inverted to empty the contents into the plastic waste bag. The plastic waste bag should be sealed, and the bag and contents placed in a Council garbage.

Alternatively, the contents of the base unit can be distributed around the nature areas adjacent to the shed: distribute over a wide area in direction of the wind.

The "permanent filter" is shaped to match the shape of the base unit. Care should be taken in returning the "permanent filter" on the base unit before placing the motor unit on the base: it only fits one way. Ensure the clips on both sides of the extractor are locked in place and test the extractor by turning on the power.

The "permanent filter" and the fine HEPA filter will be cleaned and maintained on a periodic basis, members should not clean these.

When using any dust generating machines like table saw, belt sander, drum sander, drop/mitre saw, panel saw and the like, ensure the dust extractors are turned ON and the slide valves are open in the interest of the health of your fellow members. When finished close the slide valves to maintain suction in the extraction system.

Baton


Here is a picture of a ceremonial baton which Bob L made in the shed. He turned the wood, made the copper crown at home and JJ turned up the knob on top.

Distaffs

Mark has been turning a number of distaffs for a friend of his.

A distaff is a tool used in spinning. It is designed to hold the un-spun fibres, keeping them untangled and thus easing the spinning process. It is most commonly used to hold flax, and sometimes wool, but can be used for any type of fibre.

These are some photos of distaffs and various styles of drop spindles and spin bowls.

If you do not know what a distaff is, and you are not alone, this explanation may help:

"Device used in hand spinning in which individual fibres are drawn out of a mass of prepared fibres held on a stick (the distaff), twisted together to form a continuous strand, and wound on a second stick (the spindle). It is most often used for making linen; wool does not require a distaff (see carding)." See more <u>here</u>.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

My name is Beverley Gould and I am a Senior Constable at Hornsby Police Station. I have been working at C.A.R.E.S. (Community and Road Education Scheme) across the road within the HART Complex, 451 Mona Vale Road, St Ives for the past 10 years. (Across Mona Vale Road from the StIves Showground, ed)

C.A.R.E.S. is a joint initiative between the NSW Police, the Education Department and Transport NSW to teach children from the age of 10 (fifth and sixth class) road rules to help reduce road trauma. The area we cover is from the Sydney Harbour Bridge to the Hawkesbury River Bridge, all the Northern Beaches and out as far as Castle Hill.

We have one class per day at our centre. Hornsby Police Station supplies two police officers to educate the children about road safety and Transport NSW offers the centre a small grant each year for us to purchase bicycles and helmets. This year we were able to purchase 8 bicycles. We have just over 100 bicycles about 30 of which are in the shed to be repaired (mainly brake cable and lever problems). Our centre relies on grants and donations as well to keep the centre operating.

One of the officers at the station used to be a push bike mechanic and he would come out to our facility throughout the year to maintain our bikes, however he now has a transfer and is unable to help us out.

I was just wanting to know if any of the gentleman at The Men's Shed who are confident in fixing brake cables, brake levers and general maintenance of push bikes would be interested in volunteering their time to help us out. I am capable of changing tyres and replacing tubes but that's where my ability ends. We have the necessary tools for repair work and we have the parts and a shed for the repairs to be carried out in.

Our centre is open Monday to Thursday from 8:30am until 3pm. We are closed school holidays. Our phone number is 9983 1142. It is not easily accessible by the public as we are within the grounds of HART. Regards Beverley
