# The Shed awarded a Grant to produce Bird / Animal Hollows





#### Does the moon rotate?

Most people think that the moon does not rotate on its own axis. After all, it always presents the same side to us and never shows the other half, or dark side. Not that that side is in perpetual darkness but we never see it. You can easily disprove this by simply taking tennis ball, the moon, and rotate it around your hand, the earth, without rotating the ball. You will see that at some point in the rotation every part of the surface will be visible.

To keep the same face showing to earth, the moon must rotate on its axis once for every full orbit around earth. So, the moon rotates once every 29.5 days (synodic period).

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
