Official Opening of the Ku-ring-gai Community Workshop Extension

On Friday, 26 October, the long-awaited extension to the Ku-ring-gai Community Workshop was officially opened in the presence of a number of dignitaries from all three levels of Government. Present were Damon Guerrera, representing Hon. Paul Fletcher MP - Federal Member for Bradfield, Mr Jonathan O'Dea MP- State Member for Davidson, Mr Alister Henskens, SC MP-Member for Ku-ring-gai and Cr. Jennifer Anderson, Mayor of Ku-ring-gai. The Bendigo Community Bank, (Turramurra and Lindfield branches), was represented by Dean Castell and Sharon Franke.

They all represent organisations that have generously supported the Shed over the years through donations and grants and made the much-needed extensions possible. We are very grateful for their support and look forward to our ongoing relationship.

Stephen Lloyd, President of the Shed, opened the proceedings by introducing and welcoming the guests and then provided a summary of the construction and fit-out process. He particularly paid tribute to Malcolm Bailey, the project manager, for his dedication and endless drive to make it happen. He acknowledged the Building Committee, "Outwest Sheds",



the builders for their excellent workmanship as well as the many Shed members who provided their substantial input.

The guest speakers noted that the Ku-ring-gai Shed, and others like it, are an important link in the improvement of mental and men's health in our community. They provide a venue for collaboration between diverse members of the community under the banner of the Shed.

Members are involved in personal and community projects from the Council bee box program to Boccia slides for Cerebral Palsy Australia, to folding benches for Studio Artes, and many more projects for the community.



As Cr. Jenifer Anderson said in her address, the Shed has exceeded all her expectations from when it was first mooted many years ago and is now an invaluable part of the community.

The ceremony was followed by a morning tea catered by Meals on Wheels and distributed by the cooking group.

An inspection of the new facilities was enjoyed by all.

Call for Bushcare Group

The Shed submitted a Bush Management Plan as part of the DA approval for the extension. The two areas of activity for us are enclosed with logs and include the area to the north of the Shed and the area near the dog training field that is the southern side of old parking area. The idea is that Duffy's Forest is encouraged to regenerate to its natural state in these areas.

Shed Members are invited to register their interest in participating with a Bushcare Group to initiate planting, general natural restoration and maintenance in line with Council's requirements. We are looking for some 7 to 8 shedders. The group will have an ongoing active participation in order to maintain natural restoration and further develop an extension to the natural environment within the immediate area around our shed. You will learn something about native plants of the Duffy's Forest Ecological Community while helping the Shed meet its obligations as part of the building extension.

This will be an opportunity to learn something of natural bush care in our area and hopefully have a bit of fun participating. For those interested, please Put your name on the sign-on sheet in the lunchroom or email kushed@bigpond.com with Bushcare in the subject line.

Interestingly, several native plants have come up through the disturbed soil surrounding the extension with the recent heavy rain. Bruce Donnelly, who is a qualified Bushcare trainer, will oversee our involvement and provide periodic reports to Council.
